NOVA Pets Health Center to support the goal of Homeward Trails; to help reduce costs; to assist in adoption efforts.

CHANTILLY, Virginia: Tuesday, NOVA Pets Health Center (NPHC) partnered with Homeward Trails Animal Rescue in Fairfax to support their goal of increasing fosters and adoptions of animals by assisting in the care and boarding of canine and feline rescues.

Homeward Trails is a nonprofit organization that rescues cats and dogs from high-kill shelters, or whose owners can no longer care for them, and find them permanent adoptive homes in Virginia, Washington, DC, and Maryland.

“We are excited to partner with NOVA Pets because it has been difficult to find affordable vet care in Northern Virginia,” Rebecca Goodhart, Deputy Director of Homeward Trails, said Tuesday. “The less money we spend per animal the more animals we can save.”

Homeward Trails Animal Rescue saves an average of 2,700 dogs a year, roughly 200 dogs per month, and are in constant demand of fosters, volunteers, and animal advocates as the organization continues to grow.

NPHC is committed to staying involved with the community from offering yearly internships to students in animal-related vocations, to conducting educational programs in local schools and events with the goal of bringing awareness and animal education to the public.

“We wanted to do more for our community and ultimately help animals,” Soubhaan Masood, NPHC Office Manager said about the partnership. “What better way than to offer high quality service to a nonprofit organization right in our backyard to save rescued animals.”
